We also cannot wait to be wowing audiences with our very own production in the New Year, rehearsals for Legally Blonde Jr are going well and our students are working hard.

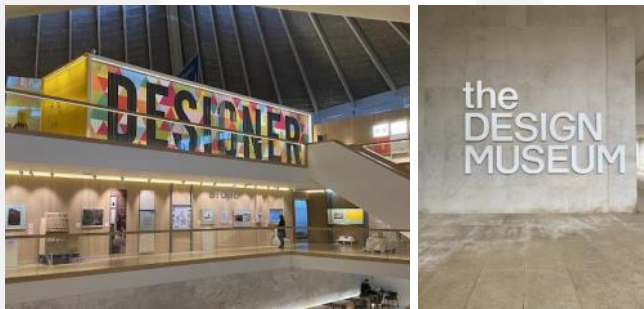


PARLIAMENT TRIP

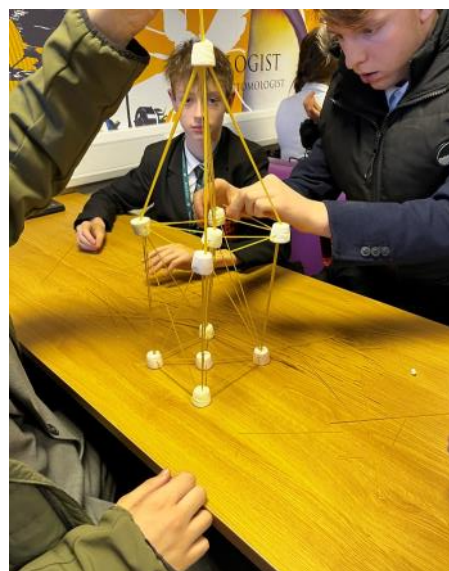

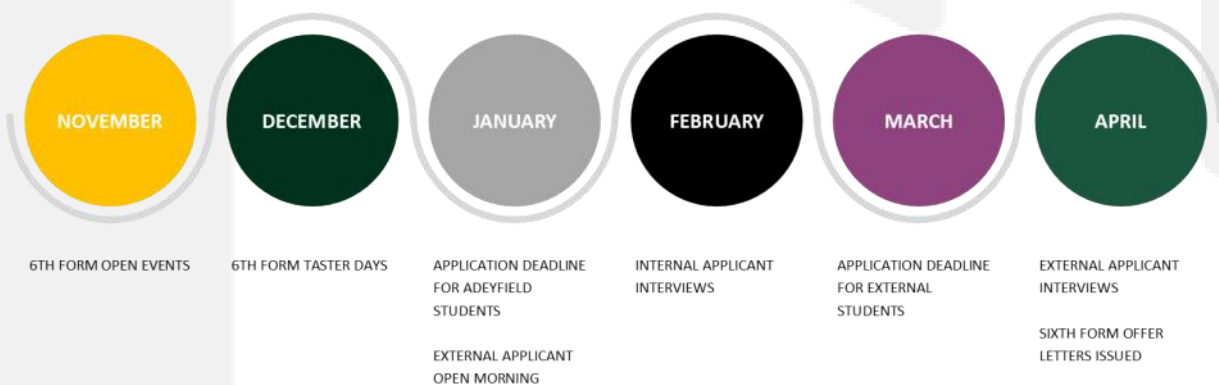
SIXTH FORM TASTER DAY
